


COMMUNITY MAP

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City of Aleknagik Municipal Boundary
 The description of the municipal boundaries approved by the State is as follows:
 Beginning at the NE corner of Section 28, un-surveyed T10S, R56W, Seward Meridian, Alaska; thence West to the SE corner of Section 19, T10S, R56W; thence Northwesterly to the NW corner of Section 10, T10S, R56W; thence South to the SW corner of Section 34, T10S, R56W; thence East to the SE corner of Section 34, T10S, R56W; thence Southeast to the SE corner of Section 1, T11S, R56W; thence East to the SE corner of Section 35, T10S, R56W; thence North to the NE corner of Section 1, T11S, R56W; thence North to the NE corner of Section 1, T11S, R56W; thence East to the SE corner of Section 35, T10S, R56W; thence North to the point of beginning, containing 19.9 square miles, more or less.

Community Map—Maps are useful in illustrating land use patterns, land ownership, location of utilities, and also in planning for future improvements. These maps can be prepared by surveying the land and/or by enlarging aerial photographs.

The Community Map shown here was prepared from an Air Photo Tech Inc. aerial photograph taken in 1980 at a height of 6,000 feet, and enlarged to a scale of 1:3,600 (1 in. = 300 ft.). This map has been used to display the present utilities, public facilities, and residential and commercial development. In addition, other information has been portrayed which will aid in evaluating the area for new construction and city expansion.

The Regional Map, prepared from a 1980 Air Photo Tech Inc. photograph, taken at an elevation of 6,000 feet and printed at a scale of 1:16,800 (1 in. = 1,400 ft.), clearly shows the community and the surrounding area. The community is situated on the north and south shores of Lake Aleknagik. The city is partially surrounded on the west, east and north by the Ahklut Mountains. The topography in the immediate area consists of glacially rounded mountains and hills with elongated glacially carved lakes.

This kind of data is very important in developing plans for community growth and expansion. It is useful in gaining an understanding of some of the natural and man-made features that affect the community, including flood hazards, erosion, source of water supply and location of waste disposal sites.
