


COMMUNITY MAP COUNCIL

Note: These maps have been prepared from uncontrolled aerial photographs. Scale is approximate and minor distortion may exist. Property and utility information has been generalized from many sources and may contain minor inconsistencies. These maps should not be construed as surveys. On-site investigations should be conducted prior to construction.



Note—Many structures in Council were built in the early 1900's during and shortly after the Gold Rush. Some are still used (such as Law's home which contains the general store), while others are abandoned and in various stages of deterioration. Of the abandoned structures, only the old hotel and school are designated on this map.

Many residences in Council are not inhabited year round but are occupied much of the summer and occasionally during the remainder of the year. All have been shown as residential units.

Note—A private, crank operated telephone system serves 5 residences in Council. The system is not integrated into the ALASCOM system.

Community Map—Maps are useful in illustrating land use patterns, ownership, location of utilities and in planning for future village improvements. These maps can be prepared by surveying the land and/or by enlarging aerial photographs.

The Community Map shown here was prepared from a BLM aerial photograph taken in 1974 at a height of 8,400 feet and enlarged to a scale of 1:2,400 (1 in. = 200 ft.). This map has been used to display the present utilities, residential and commercial development, public facilities and to portray other information which will aid in evaluating the area for new construction and for potential village expansion.

The Regional Map above, was prepared from a BLM aerial photograph taken at a height of 8,400 feet and enlarged to a scale of 1:16,800 (1 in. = 1,400 ft.), clearly shows the village and the surrounding area.

This kind of data is very important in developing plans for community growth and expansion. It is useful in gaining an understanding of some of the natural and man-made features that affect the community (e.g., flood hazards, erosion, source of water supply, location of waste disposal sites, etc.).
