**Community Map** The profile maps are useful in illustrating land use patterns, land status, location of power lines, water resources, waste disposal sites, and public facilities. They also provide an understanding of some of the natural features and hazards that affect the community. This information is very important in planning for community improvements and expansion.

The Community Map shown here was prepared from an aerial photograph taken in 1979 by ELM at a height of 8400 feet and enlarged to a scale of 1:2400 (1" = 200'). The Area Map was prepared from the same photo and reproduced at a scale of 1:16800 (1" = 1400').






