Flood Data

In 1974 a preliminary flood hazard study was done by the Corps of Engineers which places the 100-year flood boundary on the 20' contour line. Since this study is preliminary and no severe flood has been recorded in these areas, the flood hazard boundary has not been shown. Additional information can be obtained at the Alaska Corps of Engineers.

The sewer and water layout was taken from PHS plans. When constructed, systems may vary from those shown.


Most structures in the city are connected to the water and sewer system. For clarity, individual service connections are not shown.

Community Map—Maps are useful in illustrating land use patterns, ownership, location of utilities and in planning for future village improvements. These maps can be prepared by surveying the land and/or by enlarging aerial photographs.

The Community Map shown here was prepared from a Sealaska aerial photograph taken in 1979 at a height of 8,200 feet and enlarged to a scale of 1:2,400 (1 in. = 200 ft.). This map has been used to display the present utilities, residential and commercial development, public facilities and to portray other information which will aid in evaluating the area for new construction and village expansion.

The Regional Map, prepared from NASA high altitude, photos and printed at a scale of 1:16,800 (1 in. = 1,400 ft.), clearly shows the community and the surrounding area. This map shows that Klawock is a coastal community located at the mouth of the Klawock River. The intensely developed part of the community is located on what was once a small island. The area east of Klawock is a large valley with Klawock Lake at the center and ringed by mountains.

This kind of data is very important in developing plans for community growth and expansion. It is useful in gaining an understanding of some of the natural and man-made features that affect the community (e.g., flood hazards, erosion, source of water supply, location of waste disposal sites, etc.).

The description of the municipal boundaries approved by the State is as follows:

Commencing at point No. 1 which is a spruce post squared to 4" set 24" in the ground marked U.S.J.R. #1 (established from field notes of U.S. Indian Reservation Survey, Klawock, Alaska) from whence a 20" spruce tree bears due north 114 links marked U.S.J.R. 1 and located at mean high tide line on the north bank of Klawock Stream at the edge of a small clump of brush approximately 40 chains east of the village. Thence north to point No. 2 56.49 chains, which is a hemlock post squared to 4" set 24" in the ground at mean high tide line marked U.S.J.R. 2 from whence a 48" spruce tree bears due south 30 links, located approximately 15 chains from the mouth of a small creek emptying into the bay. Thence 73°30' W 51.00 chains to point No. 3 which is a hemlock post squared to 4" set 24" in the ground on the line of mean high tide line on the extreme northern tip of the peninsula upon which the village is located marked K.T.3. Thence S 43°W a distance of 1650 feet to point No. 4 located in channel between north end of Klawock Island and the north end of peninsula on which village of Klawock is situated; thence southerly one mile to point No. 5 located in channel between south end of Klawock Island and the south end of Wadleigh Island; thence N 45°30' E a distance of 2062 feet to point No. 6 which is a hemlock post squared to 4" set 24" in the ground at line of mean high tide on the extreme southern tip of a small peninsula cut off from the mainland by extreme high tides and locally known as Wadleigh Island marked K.T.6. Thence meandering the beach at high tide line to point of beginning.
